Lagerstroemia indica - crepe myrtle 'Myrtlettes'—These plants were grown from seed sown in March 1973. Some had bloomed by July. Plants are woody, should grow into small shrubs. Grow in a cool greenhouse or windowsill and give plenty of summer sun.

Lonicera nitida - A tender perennial that prefers bright light or full sun. Sow in ordinary potting soil with excellent drainage. Water thoroughly then allow to become moderately dry between waterings. Easily propagated from cuttings.

Oenothera perennis — Low hardy perennial. One inch wide yellow flowers. Prefers sun or light shade.

Origanum vulgare 'Aureum' - Golden oregano, a hardy perennial, good as a pot plant. Prefers excellent drainage and full sun. Water thoroughly then allow to become moderately dry. Flowerheads dry well for winter decoration. Propagate by cutting or layering.

Rosmarinus officinalis - Rosemary, a tender perennial preferring bright light or full sun but will tolerate less light during the winter. Water thoroughly then allow to become moderately dry. Prefers cool fresh air. Spray occasionally with water that has reached room temperature. Good for training and easily propagated by cutting.

Satureja montana repens - Creeping winter savory, a tender perennial preferring bright or full sun. Water thoroughly and allow to become moderately dry between waterings. Can be trained or topiaried, propagated by cutting or layering.

Scented geraniums - Tender perennials; use ordinary potting soil and provide excellent drainage. Water thoroughly and allow to become moderately dry. Propagate by cutting. Prefers bright light.

Scilla violaceae - A bulbous tropical with beautifully marked leaves. Grow in a sunny windowsill or under fluorescent light. Bulbs put up a spike of blue flowers in early spring.

Thymus serpyllum albus - A creeping evergreen ground cover. Prefers sun and dry or coarse soil.

Uniola latifolia - Graceful grass with weeping panicles of "herringbone" spikes. Plant has dense broad foliage, forms a clump up to 2 ft. across and 2-1/2 ft. high after five years and produces excellent material for dried arrangements. Trouble free in full sun and a variety of soil types. May need staking.

PLANTS FOR DISTRIBUTION AT THE 146th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PENNSYLVANIA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY:

Achimenes 'Scarlet Gem' - These tropical gesneriads are summer blooming. In winter they are completely dormant. The tiny tubers or rhizomes resume growth in spring and can be grown on the terrace or on a summy windowsill. Store dormant tubers in a plastic bag indoors in a cool, dry area.

Ajuga reptans variegata - Hardy ground cover plant that prefers half to full shade.

Aruncus aethusifolia (P. I. 318516) - This very dainty clump-forming perennial looks like a refined astilbe. Its tight creamy spikes of flowers in early summer are a small part of its year-round attractiveness. Seems to do well in a variety of soils and sites. It will tolerate light shade where it becomes more open and taller. Should make a good full sun ground cover. Introduced from Hella, Cheju-do, Republic of South Korea. Not available for commercial sources.

Azalea macrantha 'Orange Thalman' - Compact, late blooming.

Begonia 'Calla Queen' - A readily grown house plant requiring bright sunlight for five or six hours a day. Does exceptionally well under fluorescent light.

Ficus pumila - A small creeping fig that clings to any rough surface. Its holdfast roots appear at every node. Grow indoors on totem pole, pieces of porous rock, or on a three-dimensional topiary figure.

Hedera helix 'Shamrock' - An excellent house plant that requires plenty of moisture. The plant should be syringed with water frequently.

Helxine soleiroli aurea - A prostrate mosslike plant of the family Urticaceae. Usually grown in a cool greenhouse for its minute foliage. It prefers a night temperature of 55 degrees, winter sun, and summer shade. Keep the soil moist.
