1976 DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT MEDAL to JAMES S. WELLS

The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society is built around the sharing of horticultural knowledge. Everything we do, our library, our shows, our lectures, and our schools programs disseminate information. Consequently, we hold in high esteem those who look upon skills and learning as things to be made available for all who desired them.

Such a person is James S. Wells. Concentrating in the field of plant propagation, traditionally one where each practioner jealously guarded the secrets of his art, Mr. Wells was one of the first to take the opposite course. During his thirty years of activity as a propagator and nurseryman, he has always been ready to answer questions or demonstrate techniques. His crowning achievements along this line are the book *Plant Propagation Practices* which he wrote, and the International Plant Propagator's Society, of which he was a founder and first President.

We are proud to award him our Distinguished Achievement Medal.

1976 CERTIFICATE OF MERIT to VIOLA K. ANDERS

Cynics say that those who can, do, and those who can't, teach. If this a rule of pedagogy, Viola Anders is the exception that proves it. She grows the plants about which she teaches, and she does both excellently.

Herbaceous plants are her field, and in it she has no superior. For more than twenty years she has grown herbaceous plants for the Pennsylvania School of Horticulture for Women and now for Temple University; has designed and executed the School's herbaceous beds and borders, and has taught the course in herbaceous materials in a way that has made her students want to put their learning into practice.

Temple has recognized her talents by appointing her Assistant Professor in Horticulture. The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society would like to add its gesture of recognition by awarding her its Certificate of Merit.

CERTIFICATE OF MERIT to ANNE WERTSNER WOOD

As a tree is known by its fruit, so a teacher is known by her pupils. The proof of a teacher's influence is a throng of followers.

1976 SCHOOL TEACHER AWARD

NATALIE KENT KEMPNER

Many a city teacher has dreamed of instilling in her students, an awareness of the natural world. Few have been able to turn that dream into actuality. Natalie Kent Kempner is one of those few.

Working with minimal funds at an eighty year old elementary school in a part of Philadelphia's Spanish-speaking section, she has lead her pupils in ever widening cirlces of discovery by cultivating their intuitive curiosity and encouraging their boundless resourcefulness. Their museum in the school basement has housed insects (dead and alive); leaves and seeds; tiny fish and animals and their bones; plants (miraculously alive); and a wide variety of other artifacts.

Their gardens have produced some vegetables and a fine crop of weeds with pretty flowers. Their collecting expeditions have visited trash cans, markets, parks and the Poconos. They have exhibited in our Junior Flower Show and they have planted their bulbs for the spring of '77.

Natalie Kent Kempner practices what Wordsworth preached: "Come forth into the light of things, let Nature be your teacher." We salute her with our 1976 School Teacher Award, the first presented by the Society. She has set a high standard for future recipients.
